## Book of Conference Proceedings

After the international conference *New Horizons of Culture, Arts and Media in the Digital Environment* its program committee is in charge of the publishing of the conference Book of Proceedings. All authors who have presented their work at the conference are invited to send their full papers to be considered for publishing in this book by January 15<sup>th</sup> 2020 at the email addresses [institutfdu@yahoo.com](mailto:institutfdu@yahoo.com) and [fdu.conference@gmail.com](mailto:fdu.conference@gmail.com).

Each paper will be anonymously reviewed by two competent reviewers (double-blind peer review)<sup>1</sup>, while the book as a whole will have three reviewers. By submitting their paper for publication, authors give consent to its publication in print and electronic form. Those papers are not preliminary versions of papers and may not be published later in an expanded and revised form, but are rather their final, polished form. The editorial board reserves the right to make selection of the papers having in mind limited resources for publishing. Papers who do not meet the formatting guidelines or academic quality standards will not be considered.

- A paper, as a document type Word Document, should be sent electronically at the addresses [institutfdu@yahoo.com](mailto:institutfdu@yahoo.com) and [fdu.conference@gmail.com](mailto:fdu.conference@gmail.com) by January 15<sup>th</sup> 2020.
- In the e-mail subject please write: For the Book of Proceedings: Name of your paper
- A paper should be written in English or Serbian/ Bosnian/ Croatian/ Montenegrin language.
- Page size should be A4 format (21 x 29.7 cm or 8.27 x 11.69"). Left and right margins should be 2.54 cm (or 1.0"), while top and bottom margins should be 2.54 cm (or 1.0").

- Text should be in Times New Roman font; for main text font size should be 12, and for footnotes 10; in both cases line spacing should be 1,5.
- A paper size should be from 29.000 to 35.000 characters (without spaces) and should include a title page, text, footnotes and references.

**First page should contain:**

- title of the paper should be up to 10 words long, written in capital letters (caps lock), bolded, and in font size 16;
- if the paper is an outcome of a research project that is financed by a public or another body, or you have done it while using a scholarship, please provide that information in a footnote associated with the paper's title;
- author's name and surname (without title), date of birth<sup>2</sup> and affiliation – the name and place of institution where the author is employed, where she/he is studying or has done research or project;
- author's phone number;
- author's e-mail address;
- an abstract 250 to 300 words long (without references, acronyms or abbreviations); and
- up to five keywords.

**Text**

- It is recommended you cite at least two of your already published papers ranked as category M10, M20 or M40 if that is possible.
- Subtitles should be manually numbered, left aligned, and bolded.
- Second-order subtitles should be left aligned and underlined.
- Footnotes are listed at the bottom of the page on which the reference is made.
- Please use author-date Harvard system of referencing, for example (Johnson, 1995).

Required for insight into scientific work of the author and for the sake of determination of the Universal Decimal Classification (UDC) number.

- Short and in-text quotations up to 4 lines long should start and end with a double inverted comma (“quoted text”). Omitted parts of the quoted text should be marked with square brackets (“quoted text [...] ends with a double inverted comma”). When a quotation is longer than four lines, it should be given as a block of text - in that case do not use quotation marks but make a block of text and place it 1 cm inward from the right and left margin of the main body of text, leaving a 6pt big space above and below the quotation. Quotations of more than 400 characters are not recommended.

### Citing in text

- Citing a work of one author/editor: (Leggett, 2014)
- Citing two authors/editors: (Feldle and Hilgendorf, 2018)
- Citing three authors/editors: (Greenstein, Goldfarb and Tucker, 2013)
- Citing four or more authors/editors: Cite the principal author/editor and add “et al.”. For example “As stressed by Hossaini et al. (2017)...”
- No author/editor: Use the title in italics, date and page number. For example “The usage of application depends foremost of the effort of volunteers (*A Lifeline to learning: leveraging mobile technology to support education for refugees*, 2018, p. 23).”
- No author/editor and no date: Use the title in italics and ‘no date’. For example “Those are the most frequent obstacles toward European integration (*33 Steps Toward the EU*, no date)...”
- Citing multiple sources: When referring to two or more sources at the same time, separate them with semi-colons and order them chronologically. If more than one work is published in the same year, then they should be listed alphabetically by author/editor. For example, “More and more different studies (Hirtle and Hudson, 2009; Leggett, 2014; Walsh, 2016; Bonde Thylstrup, 2019; Henderson, 2019) are dealing with that issue.”
- Citing sources published in the same year by the same author: When citing more than one work of the same author published in the same year, use a lower case

letter to distinguish between them. The letters should also be included in the reference list. For Example, “Selwyn (2016a) discusses if and how technology is good for education. In his next work Selwyn (2016b) elaborates key issues and debates about that issue.”

## References

The reference list should include only the works that the author cited or referred to in his/her article. All works should be listed according to their author's surname, in alphabetical order.

BOOKS should be listed in the following manner: Surname of the author/editor, First letter of his/her name. (Year of publication in round brackets) *Title in italics*. Edition if not the first. Place of publication: Publisher. Series and volume number where relevant.

- One author: Bonde Thylstrup, N. (2019) *The Politics of Mass Digitization (The MIT Press)*. Cambridge: The MIT Press.
- The texts of the same author should be ranked chronologically. If there are co-authors, the texts should be ranked according to the surname of the co-author. If the text has two authors, both authors should be noted in the order in which they appear in the published work. If the author is the editor of the issue, we put (ed.) or (eds.). When citing more than one work of the same author published in the same year, use a lower case letter to distinguish between them (for example 2018a, 2018b, 2018c).
- Two authors: Poberezhskiy, Y. S. and Poberezhskiy, G. P. (2018) *Signal Digitization and Reconstruction in Digital Radios (Artech House Signal Processing Library)*. London: Artech House Publishers.
- Three or more authors: List all the authors (no matter how many there are) and always separate the final two authors with 'and'. For example: Mainzer, K., Schwichtenberg, H. and Schuster, P. M. (eds.) (2018) *Proof and Computation: Digitization in Mathematics, Computer Science, and Philosophy*. London: World Scientific Pub Co Inc.
- Edited book: Nikolić, M. and Dragičević Šešić, M. (eds.) (2019) *Situating Populist Politics: Arts and Media Nexus*. Belgrade: Institute for Theatre, Film, Radio and Television of the Faculty of Dramatic Arts in Belgrade.

- Chapter in a book: Sparkes, V. (2010) 'Function of the spine', in Everett, T. and Kell, C. (eds.) *Human movement: an introductory text*. 6th edn. Edinburgh: Churchill Livingstone Elsevier, pp. 191-209
- E-book should be listed in the following manner: Surname of the author/editor, First letter of his/her name. (Year of publication in round brackets) *Title in italics*. Available at: URL (Downloaded: date). For example: Lessig, L. (2004) *Free Culture*. Available at: [https://manybooks.net/titles/lessiglother04free\\_culture.html](https://manybooks.net/titles/lessiglother04free_culture.html) (Downloaded: 30 July 2019).

## JOURNALS

- Articles from a journal in print should be listed in the following manner: Surname of the author/editor, First letter of his/her name. (Year of publication in round brackets) 'Article title', *Name of a journal in italics*, Volume (unbracketed) and, where applicable, number (in brackets), page number. For example: Stone, D. and Elena, D. (2018) 'Advance diaspora diplomacy in a networked world', *International Journal of Cultural Policy*, 24 (6), pp. 696-709.
- Articles from daily newspapers should be listed in the same manner but, instead of volume and number, date of publishing should be given.
- Articles from electronic journals should be listed in the same way as articles in printed journals and doi, if available, should be included at the end of a reference. For example: Stevenson, D., Balling, G., and Kann-Rasmussen, N. (2017) 'Cultural participation in Europe: shared problem or shared problematisation?', *International Journal of Cultural Policy*, 23 (1), pp. 89-106. doi: 10.1080/10286632.2015.1043290.
